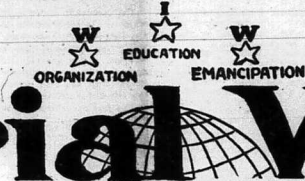


The working class and the employing class have nothing in common. There are no princes as long as hunger and want are found among millions of working men and the few who make up the employing class have all the good things of life.
